Mosaic

The direct method places tesserae straight into a cement-based adhesive. The indirect method involves drawing the design in reverse on paper or cloth before assembly.

Smalti and marble are cut into pieces using a hammer and a hardy set into a log, often to convey emotions, personal stories, and ideas. The gaps between tesserae can be filled with grout, which is spread across the mosaic surface with a grouting squeegee.

Creating a mosaic involves several stages: a color sketch, a reverse image, and the completed mosaic. The process begins with a color sketch in oil pastel to give a clear idea of the final look. Next, tesserae

are glued face-down onto a reverse image on paper. The mosaic is then transferred to a solid surface and the paper is removed. The completed mosaic features vitreous glass arranged on a board.

The mosaic technique in visual arts involves carefully arranging small pieces of material to form a larger image or pattern. This craft provides added dimensions and a wide range of creative thinking and innovations, and this technique is quite a time-consuming process compared with others because it needs much more effort, but, in the end, the result is a breathtaking masterpiece.

Sculpture

The two traditional methods of making sculptures are carving and modeling.

A carved sculpture is created by removing excess material from a block of hard substance like stone, marble, or wood. The tools employed for carving differ depending on the material used. Various materials such as clay, wax, metal, fabric, glass, wood, plaster, rubber, and assorted found objects can be employed. These materials can undergo carving, modeling, molding, casting, forging, welding, sewing, assembly, or other methods of shaping and combining. Sculptures made from hard materials are typically refined using files, rasps, rifflers, and other abrasive tools.

Sculptures created from soft materials can either naturally harden over time or can be rendered more durable through firing in a kiln. Examples of marble carving tools are lump hampers; examples of wood carving tools are cabinet rasp, straight gouge, and chisel. Examples of rifflers are stone, marble, and wood.

Modeling is a sculptural technique where material is added to create form, contrasting with carving, where material is subtracted to reveal the form. Unlike carving, modeling allows for adjustments during the process, and the resulting medium, such as fired clay or preserved wax, is not as enduring as stone or wood carvings.

Examples of modeling tools are wire-ended cutting tools, curved molding tools, spatula-ended wax modeling tools, and rounded wax modeling tools. spirit lamp for heating wax modeling tools. Stages in the lost-wax method of casting the original model: the hollow wax figure is cast, the figure is baked in casting mold, the statue is stripped of clay, the statue is finished, and the statue is cleaned.

Printmaking

Printmaking is a method in visual arts where images are created by transferring ink from a matrix onto paper or other surfaces. Its appeal lies in the ability to replicate designs in multiple forms, making them widely accessible.
