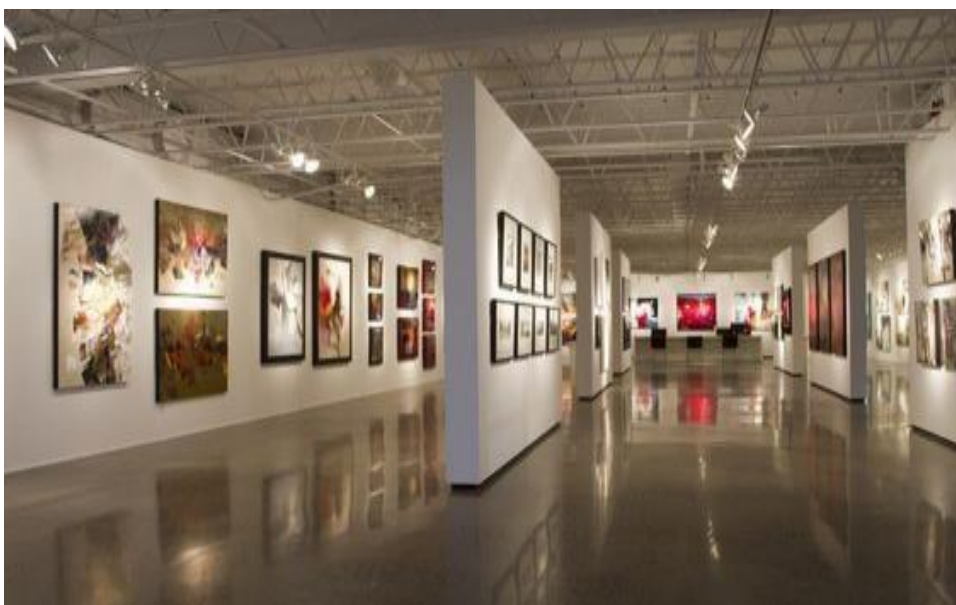


Figure 5. Ideal display of artworks.

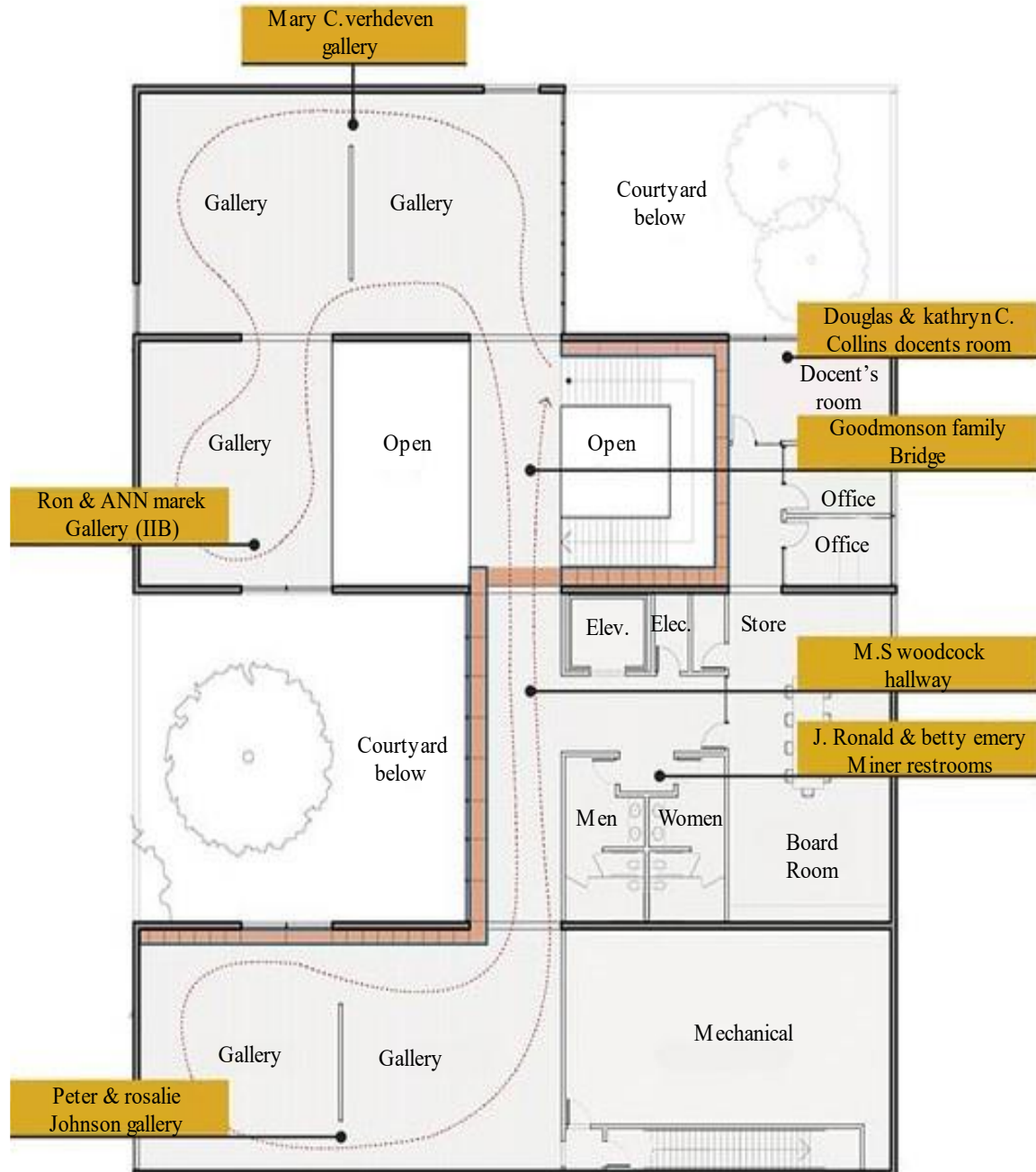


Figure 6. Clear circulation path.

- *Acoustics and Environmental Control:* Acoustics and environmental control are important considerations for creating a comfortable and conducive gallery environment. Effective soundproofing and climate control systems help maintain stable temperature, humidity, and air quality levels to protect artworks from deterioration and provide a pleasant experience for visitors.
- *Materials and Finishes:* The selection of materials and finishes should enhance the visual appeal and functionality of the gallery space. Durable and easy-to-maintain materials such as hardwood floors, neutral wall colors, and non-reflective surfaces help create a clean and inviting backdrop for artworks without distracting from their presentation.
- *Way finding and Signage:* Clear way finding signage and informative labels help orient visitors and provide context for artworks.
- *Technology Integration:* Technology can enhance the gallery experience through multimedia presentations, digital catalogs, interactive exhibits, and virtual tours.

- Display cases are ideal for showcasing small or delicate artworks, artifacts, or collectibles.

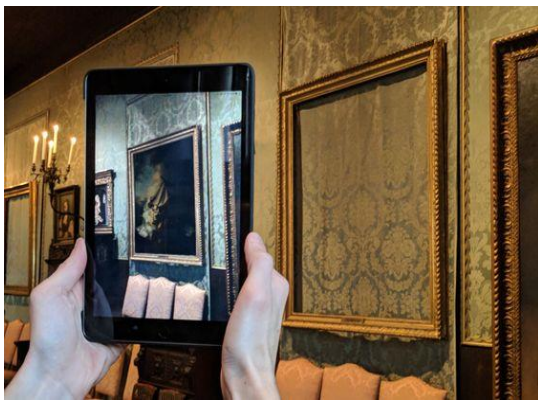


Figure 29. Augmented reality.
