

The Evolving Role of Librarians in Shaping Modern Spaces

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Abstract

Today, libraries have transformed from being merely quiet sanctuaries for reading and research into vibrant, interactive spaces that promote learning, creativity, and collaboration. These modern libraries serve as hubs of innovation, where community members can engage with not only books but also technology, multimedia resources, and each other. This evolution reflects a broader shift in the role of librarians, who are no longer just custodians of books and information but are emerging as active facilitators of knowledge, community engagement, and space design. Librarians today are taking on increasingly diverse and dynamic responsibilities. They are embracing roles as educators, technology integrators, and designers of user-centered environments. Their in-depth understanding of user behavior, combined with their practical experience in managing resources and services, enables them to create library spaces that are both welcoming and highly functional. These environments are tailored to meet the changing demands of users, incorporating flexible seating, digital access points, collaborative workspaces, and creative zones like makerspaces and multimedia labs. The shift from traditional library management to proactive space planning, digital literacy promotion, and enhanced user engagement highlights the evolving identity of the modern librarian. This study aims to explore how librarians are redefining their professional roles in response to technological advancements and the diverse needs of their communities. It also examines how their efforts contribute to the transformation of libraries into dynamic, inclusive, and tech-friendly public spaces that support lifelong learning, innovation, and community development.

INTRODUCTION

During the ancient times, libraries were mainly focused on the storage and preservation of books and other written materials. Librarians were regarded as the gatekeepers to this valuable collection, ensuring that these resources were organized, protected and accessible. However, in modern era, rapid advancements in technology have significantly transformed how information is stored, accessed and shared. The advent of digital age has given rise to new transformation in library spaces and systems, reshaping not only the tools and technologies, but also the role of librarians.

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- *Evolution of libraries in the digital age:* Libraries today are no longer limited to physical spaces for printed materials; they are now hybrid institutions that combine physical and digital resources to meet the wide range of ever-changing user demands. This change has redefined the library's role in society.

Digital collection has enhanced or even outgrown the physical collection. Users can access a variety of information remotely, 24/7, through databases, e-books, audiobooks, as well as online journals. In addition, libraries also provide access to multimedia tools, streaming platforms and virtual learning environments. In order to support this digital expansion, librarians curate the digital resources, teach users to critically evaluate online content, and provide tech support for digital tools.

Also, modern libraries have adopted the concept of libraries as a community centre. They provide more than just books—they provide programming for all age groups, such as tech tutorials, literacy workshops, mental health support services, cultural events and job readiness training. Many libraries have designed makerspace, innovation labs, recording studios, collaborative workspaces, etc. to encourage active creation and engagement among users.

Library infrastructure has been highly impacted by this change. The traditional static shelving is replaced by open, flexible floor plans, and the technology-rich environment facilitate the user need to access computers, internet and software. In this way, libraries have developed into welcoming, flexible spaces that encourage creativity, community engagement, innovation and lifelong learning.

- *Evolving role of librarians:* The role of librarians has expanded significantly. Librarians of today are educators, tech experts, community builders as well as space designers. Their responsibilities go far beyond the traditional cataloguing and reference services, which shows how important their role is in promoting digital literacy, lifelong learning, and fair access to knowledge.
- *Librarians as designers of learning environments:* Modern librarians are involved in shaping both physical and digital library environments. They improve the design of spaces by identifying user needs, examining community demographics, and integrating innovations in education and technology. In academic libraries, collaborative spaces are emphasized, but public libraries typically concentrate on interactive and family-oriented children's sections.

Librarians also provide user services, encompassing mobile-optimized websites and virtual reference systems. They apply principles of user-experience design, instructional design, and information architecture to guarantee accessibility and diversity. Moreover, librarians shape policy and strategy, promoting inclusive practices and digital equity.

METHODOLOGY

The present study utilizes a qualitative methodology, integrating current literature on contemporary librarianship, library architecture, and user-focused service frameworks. The research utilizes secondary data, comprising scholarly papers, institutional reports, and case studies from Indian libraries, including the Vikram Sarabhai Library and Gujarat Vidyapith Library. The research also includes observational observations regarding space use, user requirements, and librarian participation in library design processes. No original data were gathered via interviews or surveys; the research is based on an extensive examination of recorded practices and trends in the evolving field of librarianship.

The Shifting Role of Librarians

- *Traditional roles of librarians:* Traditionally, the librarian's primary responsibility was to manage and preserve physical book collection. They were skilled in organizing, categorizing and preserving materials so that users could efficiently access information. Standard tools of the trade consisted of Dewey Decimal System and card catalogues. The librarian's desk was the centre for information queries, reference help and research assistance, especially in academic and public library settings [1].

These positions were especially important during the time when information was scarce and centralized. For example, Gujarat Vidyapith Library or the Sayaji Rao Gaekwad Library in Vadodara take great pride in the depth and range of its printed collections, which required highly

trained librarians to help the patrons to navigate through these materials (Gujarat Vidyapith Library, n.d.). Similarly, school librarians introduced students to the world of books and organized learning while focusing on developing early research and reading skills.

During these early variations, librarian's job was focused and specialized with the main concern being storage and retrieval of physical books. Their position was respected but often viewed as static and behind-the-scenes.

- *Rise of digital technologies and new library services:* The late 20th and early 21st centuries saw a rapid expansion of digital technologies that totally changed how information is produced, stored, and accessed. As the internet revolutionized libraries had to change fast to avoid obsolescence. Librarians were the ones leading this shift, embracing digital tools and reshaping their services to satisfy the needs of tech-savvy users.

Librarians are assigned with teaching the users on how to use online databases, digital government services and e-readers. In underprivileged areas, the Digital Gujarat Portal offer access to digitized government documents, e-learning platforms, online book lending systems, and various other online services (Digital Gujarat, n.d.).

Apart from that, academic librarians too have taken on new responsibilities. For example, many of the libraries in Gujarat like the Central Library of Gujarat University, Parul University Libraries, etc. have implemented library automated system called SOUL (Software for University Libraries) developed by INFLIBNET, Gandhinagar (Parul University, n.d.). Academic librarians support digital archiving and data management. They also support the faculty and students in using advanced databases, citation tools like Zotero and Mendeley, remote access to e-resources as well as institutional repositories for open-access publishing [2-4].

Librarians have thus become educators of digital literacy, helping individuals to actively participate in today's knowledge-based economy.

- *Librarians as community-centered space designers:* The most significant development in librarianship is the role of librarians as community-centered space designer. Libraries today are no longer the quiet reading spaces; they serve as centres of creativity, collaboration and connection. Librarians are actively involved in designing these experiences both through infrastructure and in services.

One notable example is Vikram Sarabhai Library of IIM Ahmedabad. This library has been redesigned as a multi-functional space that includes seminar rooms, children's area, separate reading areas, VR corner, etc. Here, librarians help organize author talks, orientation sessions and exhibitions, hence creating an engaging learning environment for all age groups.

Another example is the transformation of school libraries. Many progressive school libraries are rebranded as 'learning commons'. Here librarians work collaboratively with the teachers to include technology, project-based learning and extra-curricular activities [5].

The Key Contributions of Librarians to Library Design

- *User-Centered Design:* Librarians play a vital role in ensuring that the libraries are designed with users in mind. Their daily interaction with users ranging from young children and students to professionals to senior citizens.

For example, children's area usually has playful furniture, interactive displays, intellectual games, etc. to promote early literacy in a playful and engaging ways. For students, librarians design spaces like quiet study area, collaborative spaces, etc. For working professionals and job-seekers, librarians provide access to business databases, co-working spaces, tech rooms for webinars, interviews or workshops. For seniors, librarians offer thoughtful features like large print books, better lighting, comfortable seating, magnifying tools, etc. [6-7].

- *Flexibility and Adaptability:* Another major contribution that librarians make is promoting adaptability and flexibility. As the library services evolve, librarians help design spaces that can ease up the transition. A space can serve as a reading area in the morning, coding workshop in the afternoon and a community forum in the evening using modular furniture, movable shelves, and retractable walls. At the Kavi Narmad Central Library at Surat, such flexible spaces allow the library to host various events like school children's robotics workshop, poetry readings, health awareness camps, and many more [8].

Additionally, librarians recommend technology-ready infrastructure, making sure there are enough power outlets, Wi-Fi, digital screens, soundproof areas, etc. Librarians help in planning areas for collaborative learning spaces, digital labs, and data access terminals in order to adapt the evolving academic trends.

Librarians make sure that design decisions are future-proof and flexible to adapt the emerging technologies and evolving user needs.

- *Inclusivity and Accessibility:* Librarians ensure that libraries are welcoming and accessible to all, regardless of age, gender, ability, or background. They often advocate for inclusive design features that might be missed by administrators and architects due to lack of direct user interactions.

Librarians in public libraries have played a crucial role in implementing features like wheelchair ramps, tactile flooring, multilingual signages, etc in response to patron needs. In academic settings, librarians suggest adding quiet rooms, fidget-friendly materials and adjustable lightings for the neurodivergent users. Also, they help procure and train users with assistive technologies like text-to-speech software, screen magnifier, and speech recognition students that are essential for students with learning differences or physical disabilities [9-10].

Collaboration with Architects and Designers

Modern library design is a multidisciplinary project that combines structural and aesthetic knowledge of architects and interior designers along with the librarian's practical community-driven observations. While architects focus on the physical structure, flow and aesthetics of the building, and interior designers concentrate on usability, comfort and ambience; without librarian's input the spaces may not reflect how the users actually use and interact with the library.

Librarians offer practical knowledge of day-to-day operations, user preferences, and evolving user needs. They understand where the busy areas will be, what type of users will use them, and how technology fits into the environment. For example, librarians might suggest to place more power outlets close to the study area as well as separate zones for quiet reading, group work and digital access.

This is why collaboration between the three is essential, especially in the planning and design stages. Librarian involvement in the early stages guarantees that the finished layout supports the practicality like acoustics for study zones, visibility for supervision, and accessibility for all users. These partnerships create libraries that are not only beautiful structures but also effective, welcoming and future-ready.

Modern Library Spaces & their Benefits to Users

Modern library design consists of various functional spaces that are designed to meet the requirements of variety of patrons. Librarians, as co-designers, play a vital role in shaping spaces (in digital, social and physical aspects) that are aligned with the user demands [11 – 17].

- *Quiet Study Zones:* These spaces are acoustically isolated, featuring individual desks, minimal distraction and sound-absorbing furniture.

User Benefits: These spaces support deep concentration and academic performance in students. They also provide a calm environment for professionals preparing for exams or certifications. As well as serve writers and researchers who need extended periods of quiet time.

Librarian's Role: Librarians analyze user preferences, traffic patterns and peak hours to choose the best location and design for the quiet study zones. They also make sure that these spaces are easily accessible and integrated with necessary technology (charging stations, Wi-Fi)

- *Collaborative Workshops:* These are flexible, open spaces that allow the users to work in groups. They are often equipped with whiteboards, movable tables, digital screens, and other shared tech tools.

User Benefits: These spaces are quiet beneficial for study groups, startup teams as well as co-researchers by promoting peer learning and knowledge exchange through group discussions and project-based learning.

Librarian's Role: By monitoring student behaviours and conducting user surveys, librarians plan movable furniture layout, sound management and technology integration in order to support real-time collaboration

- *Makerspaces and Innovation Labs:* These are the interactive creation spaces that offer tools like 3D Printers, laser cutters, robotics kits, and design and coding software.

User Benefits: These spaces enable underprivileged communities to access technology; encourage design thinking, entrepreneurship, and STEM education. These spaces promote innovation and creativity among the users via hand-on learning.

Librarian's Role: For such spaces, the role of a librarian is to curate tools, run workshops, and provide training to the users. They make sure that the space aligns well with the educational trends and community interests, such as preparation for employment, and school projects.

- *Children's Learning & Play Area:* These are live interactive spaces featuring sensory play items, storytelling corners, age-appropriate furniture, thematic displays.

User Benefits: These spaces offer safe and stimulating environments to promote early literacy and stimulate learning by performing. These also encourages family participation and cross-generational bonding.

Librarian's Role: Librarians collaborate with teachers and child psychologist to design these spaces, plan programmes, and include literacy tools with play-based learning.

- *Media Labs and Digital Access:* These spaces are the technology-focused rooms equipped with high-performance computers, scanners, audio-visual editing tools, fast internet, and many such latest technologies.

User Benefits: These spaces help the rural and low-income users to overcome the digital divide and gives them access to expensive and specialized technologies including digital content creation.

Librarian's Role: The role of librarian is to train the users, provide them tech support, and curate software tools depending on the needs and necessities of the users.

- *Cultural and Community Event Spaces:* These spaces are multi-purpose halls or open areas that are used for cultural events, author talks, exhibitions, lectures, as well as public gatherings.

User Benefits: These spaces encourage community engagement and communications. These spaces also provide free or low-cost recreational activities resulting in enhanced local identity and openness.

Librarian's Role: Librarians organize events, collaborate with local groups, and promote equality in a way that reflects the needs and diversity of the community.

- *Wellness and Reflection Areas:* These are the calm spaces for rest, meditation or mental health resources which usually consists of cozy furniture, indoor plants, and natural lightings.

User Benefits: These spaces promote the use of mindfulness techniques within a learning environment to reduce stress and promote emotional well-being. This kind of spaces provides a safe haven for the overwhelmed students, or neurodivergent individuals.

Librarian's Role: To properly design, program and plan such spaces, librarians collaborate with counsellors or social workers.

- *Accessibility and Inclusive Features:* These are not separate spaces but a design principle that is incorporated throughout the library, e.g. Wheelchair-accessible layout, movable furniture and multilingual signage.

User Benefits: These spaces create a welcoming and friendly atmosphere for everyone by reducing the obstacles faced by the users who struggle with language, mobility, or sensory issues.

Librarian's Role: The role of librarians is to serve as consultants and advocates, making sure that accessibility and welcoming features are incorporated in the design from the planning stage, rather than it being an afterthought. They also guide the staff in inclusive communication and assistive technologies.

Librarians bring their knowledge and practical experience into the designing process. They play a vital role in library designing user-centric, flexible spaces that support collaboration and technology.
