Additionally, these programs aim to implement sustainable agricultural and water management practices, improve access to essential services, facilitate market access, provide training and education, promote renewable energy use, strengthen community resilience, and foster collaborative efforts among various stakeholders. The Government of India has launched various initiatives and policies aimed at supporting the economically weaker section (EWSs) and low-income group (LIGs) to ensure access to affordable housing and enhance their living standards. Here are some of the key programs and schemes:

The Indira Awaas Yojana (IAY) was introduced in 1985–86 under the Rural Landless Employment Guarantee Programme (RLEGP) and later became a sub-scheme of Jawahar Rozgar Yojana (JRY) in April 1989. It became an independent scheme on January 1, 1996. The primary objective of IAY is to provide grants for house construction to scheduled castes (SC), scheduled tribes (ST), freed bonded laborers, and non-SC/ST rural poor below the poverty line.

The Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (PMAY) consists of two parts: PMAY-Urban and PMAY-Rural. PMAY-Urban aims to achieve affordable housing for all urban poor by 2022 and includes components such as In-situ Slum Redevelopment (ISSR), Credit Linked Subsidy Scheme (CLSS), Affordable Housing in Partnership (AHP), and Beneficiary-Led Individual House Construction or Enhancement (BLC). PMAY-Rural aims to ensure that all homeless households and those living in makeshift or rundown houses receive permanent homes with essential facilities by 2022, emphasizing sustainable and eco-friendly technologies and providing financial assistance for new house construction and improvement of existing houses.

The Credit Linked Subsidy Scheme (CLSS) targets the EWS and LIG segments, providing interest subsidies on housing loans with income eligibility up to ₹3 lakh for EWS and between ₹3 lakh and ₹6 lakh for LIG, reducing overall home ownership costs. The "Housing for All by 2022" initiative aims to address housing shortages among the urban poor, including slum dwellers, through the promotion of affordable housing projects, public-private partnerships, and rental housing development.

The Affordable Rental Housing Complexes (ARHCs) initiative aims to offer cost-effective rental housing options for urban migrants and economically disadvantaged individuals by converting vacant government-funded housing into ARHCs and managing construction, operation, and maintenance by public or private entities. The Interest Subsidy Scheme for Housing the Urban Poor (ISHUP) provides interest subsidies for house construction or purchase by EWS and LIG segments to reduce housing loan costs for the urban poor.

The Rajiv Awas Yojana (RAY) seeks to eliminate slums in India through redevelopment and rehabilitation, integrating slum areas into formal urban infrastructure and providing affordable housing options for slum dwellers. The Smart Cities Mission fosters sustainable and inclusive cities with essential infrastructure and a decent quality of life, including affordable housing development as part of urban renewal and retrofitting initiatives.

The Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT) guarantees access to piped water supply and sewage connections for every household, indirectly supporting affordable housing by enhancing urban living conditions. Finally, the subsidy for EWS and LIG housing aims to provide direct financial assistance or subsidies for house construction for EWS and LIG categories, reducing overall construction costs.
